We are pleased to announce that we have already been approved as an education service provider, and we are hopeful that this program will open up the door for new families to join the PCS community.

Join me in praying that this bill will overcome a court challenge (hearings before the Supreme Court of SC are scheduled for March 6), and that lawmakers will quickly make this program universal so that all families desiring a Christian education for their children are eligible.

South Carolina Education Scholarship Trust Fund Program: Available to Rising Kindergarteners and Current Public School Families

The new Education Scholarship Trust Fund Program has launched in South Carolina, making school choice possible for families who desire a Christian education.

For eligible families, this program could mean \$6,000 worth of scholarship money per student for the family's school of choice.


approval from the State this month to be a participating education provider.
